# **ARTIST'S SPOTLIGHT**

# **Beth Boyer Menking**

In 1989, Beth Menking and her father took a watercolor workshop taught by SWS member Jane Jones. It was Beth's first real introduction to watercolor. She says she has learned a lot from Jane, but the demands of family meant that she could only make art sporadically until recent years. She loves all media, but the challenge of watercolor is especially appealing to her.

Beth tends to paint landscapes, seascapes and non-objective abstractions that express the spirit of nature, although she paints other subjects as well. Scenery



attracts her because it is ever changing and when her paintings work, she is able to share God's beauty with others. She wants to interpret her vision of nature's serenity or

awesomeness and convey her feelings of wonder. Her paintings can be inspired by the view out her window or an old photo, but her paintings are based on memories or reactions rather than faithfully depicting the details of the subject matter.

Beth's five children and fourteen grandchildren have al-

ways been the primary focus of her life, but now she has more time and can paint more often. With her active family she has had to be very adaptable and so it is no surprise that she is just as flexible in the way she paints. She doesn't spend a lot of time planning the paintings; she is very intuitive. She says her process is organic rather than linear and she often doesn't know what she will paint until she is in the studio and starts to work. She may have a vague idea of where she is headed, but sometimes a painting that







started out as a landscape can evolve into a seascape. She confesses that she is not a great planner, so she credits the Creator for her results.

Painting provides a way for Beth to learn about herself. In life, she's had to balance many different priorities, so flexibility has been a great asset. Her

artwork too can look disordered in the early stages, but during the process she begins to add structure to bring it all together. Lately she has noticed that when a painting doesn't seem quite finished, she may begin to do some doodling on top and that becomes an additional element that provides structure and interest. She has always loved to draw, and the incorporation of



more line may be an intuitive reflection of who she is. She believes that drawing is a critical skill for her, and she strives to do some drawing every day.



Beth's design sense is also intuitive, but she credits Jane Jones for helping her enhance her understanding. She starts a painting by determining her basic shapes and colors and dividing the picture space into three unequal sections. Each of those pieces needs to be able to flow into the other. Then other parts of the structure become apparent as she works. She continually

checks throughout to make sure that strong elements and principles of design are being incorporated.

In 2017 Beth decided to enter the Southwestern Watercolor

Society exhibition with a painting she had done quickly a week before the deadline. It had little pre-planning and was one of the fastest paintings she had ever done, not only was it accepted, but it also received an award. She went on to have paintings accepted four more times in the next five years and earned her SWS signature. She also won an award in the Visual Art Society of Texas show with a small square seascape



that features a colorful sunset and was also quickly completed. These experiences taught her not to think too much. For her, overthinking can ruin the painting.



Beth says that she has enjoyed being a mother and grandmother and it taught her to take life one day at a time. She knows that extensive planning is essential for other painters, but that is not the way she works best. Her paintings are about her questions, not about answers, so she does better letting them unfold naturally. Her search for a unique style is ongoing, but she feels confident that she is making progress. She has sold some paintings and taken on some commissions, particularly abstractions, and will continue to enter exhibitions. She doesn't compare herself with others, she just wants to see where painting will lead her and to find out where she fits in the art world.



# May Membership Meeting/Celebration- May 9, 7:00 pm



To celebrate the end of the 2022/2023 membership year, SWS will have a very special meeting in May. To begin the meeting, SWS will provide free pizza and desserts and people will have time to socialize with other watercolor lovers. Whether you are a long time member or this is your first meeting, this is a time to get to know other SWS enthusiasts.

After that, Michael Holter will describe how to varnish watercolor paintings.This method of protecting works on paper is becoming more widely accepted in watercolor exhibitions and SWS will be accepting varnished paintings for the first time in 2023. He plans to explain the how and why to varnish paintings rather than framing under glass.

Traditionally, watercolor paintings on paper are matted and are behind glass in order to protect them but that makes the paintings heavy, fragile, and the surface is reflective. Plexiglass, which is even more expensive than glass will not break but scratches easily and there is still a glare. Varnishing is beginning to be an acceptable alternative.

There will be no Painting-of-the-Month competition at the May meeting.

The 2023/2024 membership year begins in June. **There will be no meeting in June, July, or August.**

# Mary Whyte Meeting and Workshop Delighted SWS



Rather than doing a painting demonstration, Mary Whyte used Powerpoint to give a presentation with tips about being a painter and sharing the background of some of her wonderful paintings. Her key tips for painters were to 1) Have something to say, 2) Have the ability to say it, and 3) Have the courage to say it. She described how she found people to be her subjects and how she got them to pose for her.

The group enjoyed hearing specifics regarding the different

series she did that focused on the African American Gullah women of the Low country of the South, American Vets, homeless people, blue collar workers and other groups. When she sees someone who might be a good

representative for that series, she introduces herself and asks them to pose. This has led her to have some fascinating experiences. She explains that her paintings are based on sketches done from life, photos, memory and her imagination.

During the workshop, Mary demonstrated her techniques while painting from posed live models. People who attended the workshop also painted from life and feedback shows that Mary was very helpful and encouraging as they were challenged to create paintings. Many were very pleased with the paintings they were able to produce.
