ARTIST'S SPOTLIGHT

Les McDonald

Besides his loved ones, Les McDonald, www.lesmcdonald.com, has two passions, outdoor activities like hunting and fishing, and painting. It all started when his mother inherited some property in Port O'Connor, Texas from his grandmother. In elementary school he spent time there almost every day with his rod and reel or a shotgun and shells. It wasn't unusual for him to come home with a dozen or so trout.



After all that time spent in nature, he drew a pintail duck with colored pencils in the 6th grade and showed it to his mother. When he assured her that he hadn't traced it, she was impressed. By the 8th grade he

was taking neighborhood art classes and was entering competitions. He won an award in his first exhibition at a shopping mall in Port Lavaca, Texas. At the next county fair he won the President's award even though he was competing with adults. He decided that art was his calling.

After graduating from Sam Houston State College with a degree in Commercial Art and a minor in photography, Les was a partner in an ad agency fro m the mid-seventies on, working predominantly with oil and real estate companies. In 1986, he sold his share of

the company to become a full-time fine artist specializing in wildlife art. He promptly joined the Houston Watercolor Society and began entering more competitions.



Les' early training was in oil paints, but the poor ventilation in his mid-1950s home exacerbated his allergies and watercolors are not toxic like oil solvent fumes. Although the painting process for watercol-

ors is the opposite of the approach oil painters take, Les adapted quickly to watercolors. He likes the transparency, and says the key is to start with the basics and let things dry thoroughly before going on to the next step. With watercolor it is necessary to work from light to dark and paint negatively a lot, but it is fun to use all the options to add interest to the painting. These include sponging, scraping, stamping, using drybrush, etc. In a pinch, a little

light gouache can be added to touch up details. A master of technique, in June Les will be teaching a workshop on all the different methods a watercolorist can use to apply paint to a surface.

In 1992, when his wife began to complain that his art paraphernalia was taking over the house, Les built a 720 square foott studio attached to the house with a large deck. It has a cathedral ceiling, a fireplace and northlight with his own frame shop. This studio has been where he has created his award-winning paintings. He has been selected as the sponsor print artist for Ducks Unlimited and Waterfowl U.S.A. numerous times and has been the stamp print artist for Quail Unlimited and the Dove Sportsman's Society.










Les has also competed and won awards in many watercolor societies. His most recent honor is the selection of one of his paintings for the American Watercolor Society exhibition in New York ("Dining Out" shown right). This is the second time he has had that honor. The other painting that was displayed by AWS is called "Alaska Crab Traps" (shown left). He has also had paintings selected many times by the Watercolor Art Society-Houston, SWS, and other art groups.

Les loves the outdoors. He is still an avid hunter and fisherman, but he doesn't paint on location. Instead, he takes a lot of photos when he is in nature and his compositions are often refined by the framing of his shots. He makes his selection of which ones to paint based on how well the photo is composed. Les says that it doesn't matter how good the artist's technical skills are if the design isn't good. A good composition will enable the eye to travel in a pleasing way around the painting. If there is an obstruction in



Once Les has selected the reference photo for his painting, he does a very tight drawing, usually on a half sheet of watercolor paper (15" X 22"). He believes that his paintings are more likely to be successful if he has carefully planned everything out. He prefers to paint on 300 # Arches Cold Press in order to be able to use drybrush techniques and also get fine details. After he is satisfied with the drawing, he applies a very light wash over the drawing because that will set the pencil lines and keep them from smearing. After the wash has dried completely, often overnight, he works first with the sky and background. Because he doesn't use a hairdryer except in small areas and likes to dry the paper completely between each step, he usually





has several paintings in process simultaneously. He doesn't like to use hairdryers because they push the paints into the valleys of the texture and off of the high places, and that can leave a mealy looking wash.

Les often uses masking fluid to preserve light shapes so that he doesn't need to do as much negative paint-

ing aroun small shapes. In a scene that he is painting now, he masked out the ducks so that he could freely paint the sky. He cautions that it is important not to leave the masking fluid on the painting for more than two or three days after it is applied, or it may damage the paper. Sometimes he masks the painting in sections for that reason. Brushes that are used to apply the



masking fluid should be cleaned every 4 or 5 minutes with rubber cement thinner and then soap and water.

His reputation was earned painting fur, feathers, scales and natural scenes,

but in recent years, Les has begun painting other subjects as well. He has done paintings of the farmer's market, shrimp boats, and even a still life with silver bowls. He doesn't see himself doing portraits, but he is working on a painting of longhorn cattle drive that he photographed at the Fort Worth Stockyards. He was intrigued by the animals and their

wranglers, especially one with a handlebar mustache. He is excited to see how it will turn out.

After so many accomplishments, Les is hoping it won't be too long before he will have another painting accepted into the American Watercolor Society annual exhibition so that he will earn his AWS signature. Good luck, Les. We look forward to seeing what you do next.

This year's slide show will be held on Saturday, July 8, 2023, 2:00-4:00 p.m. in the Auditorium of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library at 1515 Young Street, Dallas, TX 75201. This is a secure location with



free parking under the library in the basement. Use the address 1541 Wood St. to go directly to the library's parking garage. The J. Erik Jonsson Central Library is at the corner of Young and Ervay Streets, across from City Hall. The entrance to the underground parking garage is located on the Wood Street side of the library building. <u>Directions are on this page</u>.

The slide show is the only membership activity during the summer and gives members a chance to get together to talk about watercolor paintings and have a glass of wine and some delicious appetizers. Come spend a summer afternoon with other watercolor enthusiasts, see a lot of terrific paintings. This year everyone will receive a score sheet that will show all the artworks in order to score the paintings yourself. Exhibit at The ArtReach Gallery at Lovers Lane Church In September

SWS member artists have been invited to participate in an exhibition in September at the ArtReach Gallery at Lovers Lane United Methodist Church, 9200 Inwood Road in Dallas. Artworks must be watercolors and all SWS members are eligible to enter. The



prospectus will be posted on the SWS website under Exhibitions in early July. Entry deadline will be September 9, 2023.

The theme of this exhibit is "Fall into Watercolor." The exhibit will be in the church gallery, but the artworks submitted for this exhibit do not necessarily have to have a spiritual meaning. However, considering that art is a God-given gift, appropriate themes might include hope, new birth, anticipation, love, the glorious future, positive outlooks, nature, animals and the like. The ArtReach Committee reserves the right to refuse entries it does not deem acceptable to the theme or appropriate for display in a church or school.



Entry slides must be submitted by Saturday, September 9. ArtReach Gallery can hold 30 to 50 paintings depending upon the sizes of the artwork entered. Each artist may submit up to four (4) paintings. However, the ArtReach Committee reserves the right to limit / reject some entries should the number and size of artwork entered reaches the limit of 50 pieces. There will be no competitive jury or judgement. The selected works will be exhibited from September 14, 2023 through November 16, 2023. Paintings must be original work and hang for the duration of the show. The Lovers Lane Foundation keeps 25% of the sale price if your work is sold and the artist receives75% of the sale price.

RECENT EVENTS

One-Day Class Paints Fast and Loose Portraits with Bill Dale



"Fast and Loose Watercolor Portraits", the latest in SWS's series of one-day classes, received excellent reviews and calls for an encore. Bill Dale, who is an SWS signature member, urban sketcher and industrial designer, led the class. He demonstrated his drawing and painting techniques and provided one-on-one guidance for sixteen participants on May 20.

"Painting mindlessly takes practice," Bill said. He advocated finding photographs with strong lighting and laying out colors in advance to paint fast and spontaneously. In the class Bill provided reference photographs and then demonstrated his painting process. Participants painted along. During his initial applications he painted from top to bottom to establish color in the background and the shadows in the face. Then it was quick work to refine the features for a lovely portrait.

Since the popular class filled more than two months ahead and drew a long waitlist, a second class will be planned for later this year.

May Membership Meeting/Celebration- May 9, 7:00 pm

The last meeting of the 2022/2023 membership year was very unusual. At the beginning of the meeting, there were some games to encourage mingling and then a feast of specialty pizzas and dessert. After that, Michael Holter described how to varnish watercolor paintings. This method of protecting works on paper is becoming more widely accepted in watercolor exhibitions and SWS will be accepting varnished paintings for the first time in 2023.

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Traditionally, watercolor paintings on paper are matted and are behind glass in order to protect them but that makes the paintings heavy, fragile, and the surface is

reflective. Plexiglass, which is even more expensive than glass will not break but scratches easily and there is still a glare. Varnishing is beginning to be an acceptable alternative. Michael has been experimenting with varnishing paintings using different materials for several years.

There was no Painting-of-the-Month competition at the May meeting. It will resume in September.

SWS Hosts Western Federation of Watercolor Societies Exhibition in May

From May 6 to June 2, 2023, SWS hosted the 48th Western Federation of Watercolor Societies (WFWS) Exhibition in Grapevine, TX. The exhibition was mounted at the Tower Gallery, 636 Main Street. The juror and judge for awards was the prestigious watercolor painter, Mary Whyte, https://www.marywhyte.com



The Western Federation of Watercolor Societies includes over

5,000 artists in ten societ-



ies across the western states. The juried show is hosted each year by a different regional member society. We showcase works on paper created with a variety of water-based media. Membership in WFWS is automatic for any member of one ten western watercolor societies.

The awards reception, held on May 6th was very well attended and was hosted by Exhibition Chair, Jones McConnell Jr. (Jonesy). He introduced all of the delegates from each of the member societies and gave awards to each of the winners. There was general agreement that this was a particularly

strong exhibition. There were many positive complements about the quality and variety of the watercolor paintings on display. Styles range from paintings full of whimsy and subjective color to almost photographic imagery. Subject matter is equally varied.

Best of Show was awarded to to Chuck Rouse from the South Dakota Watercolor Society for his painting, "Backwater." SWS members who won awards were Kathy Elliott, Bev Boren, Dana Brock, Sheilagh Cooper, Jane Jones and Judi Betts. Congratulations to all the winners and every artist who had work accepted.

Western Federation Delegates Meet In Grapevine for 48th Annual WFWS Exhibition

SWS hosted the Western Federation of Watercolor Societies' annual Board Meetings, Show Opening and Awards Reception May 4th throudh the 7th in Grapevine, Texas. Each of the ten societies that are part of the Western Federation had collected the works of their member artists to ship together to the show. The paintings were matted according to the specifications on the prospectus to be framed at the gallery in order to have a consistent look in the framing.



Prior to hanging the 90 paintings in the Clock Tower Gallery on Main St in historic downtown Grapevine a rowdy bunch of SWS volunteers led by Gail Delger did the framing of the selected paintings. They needed to open all ten of the societies' shipping boxes, sort the matted paintings by sizes, check mats for cleanliness, clean each piece of plexiglas, and place the assembly in each cooresponding pre-ordered frame. The assembly line worked like a charm.



On Friday morning May 5th the current Delegates and Alternate Delegates for WFWS met in the Hilton Garden Inn in Grapevine to discuss business issues, the current agenda for the events, and view all the information for next year's event to be held in Phoenix. After lunch they enjoyed a small-painting exchange among the members before reconviening for a Networking Meeting to discuss future jurors, workshop events, membership issues, etc. Friday evening the Delegates from ten WFWS Societies enjoyed dinner together at Tolberts on Main Street in historic downtown Grapevine. On Saturday evening everyone participated in the awards reception and opening of the exhibition.


